**CLAS12 Detector Upgrade: increase x2 the nominal luminosity**  $\mathcal{L} = 10^{35}$  cm<sup>-2</sup> sec<sup>-1</sup> Presently achieved on a 5 cm LH2 target at  $I_e$  = 75 nA

**Limitation:** occupancy of Region 1 - **AI – assisted tracking is improving efficiency**

 $\Box$  overlap/replace one tracking plane to DC Region 1 with MPGD tracker – **major project**, R&D is on going

- DC chambers in Region 1 are made of 2 superlayers, of 6 layers each, and should be replaced with 6 layers of 2D  $\mu$  – Rwell.
	- Requirements:

		- Rate:  $100$  KHz/cm<sup>2</sup>

- The "WELL" acts as a multiplication channel for the ionization produced in the gas of the drift gap
- The resistive stage ensures the quenching of the spark amplitude

The **μ-RWELL** is a Resistive MPGD detector (Micro Pattern Gas Detector)

The device is composed of two elements:

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- drift/cathode PCB defining the gas gap  $(5 \mu m \; Cu$  layer on the bottom side) **1**
- μ-RWELL\_PCB (detector core) Multilayer circuit**:** *W* ⊕ resistive film ⊕ readout PCB **2**

Standard Gas mixture:  $Ar:CO_2:CF_4$  45:15:40 mixture (it also works with  $Ar:CO_2$  «green» mixture )

## **Results on 2D tracking**



### **1D pitch 0.78 mm**

Reference performances:

- 96% efficiency
- 120  $\mu$ m resolution

### **CS pitch 1.2mm**

- Due to the charge spread the working point is shifted to high voltage/gain
- Spatial resolution improves at high gain reaching  $150 \mu m$  with a strip pitch of 1.2 mm

### **Top-read-out pitch 0.78 mm**

• low-voltage/gain operation but low efficiency level (80%) due to the geometrical dead zone on the segmented amplification stage

#### Development of  $\mu$ -RWELL detectors for the upgrade of the tracking system of CMD-3 detector

An upgrade of tracking system of Cryogenic Magnetic Detector (CMD-3) is proposed using microresistive WELL technology. CMD-3 is a general purpose detector operating at the VEPP-2000 collider at Budker Institute of Nuclear Physics and intended for studies of light vector mesons in the energy range between 0.3 GeV and 2 GeV. The new subsystem consists of double-layer cylindrical detector and the end-cap discs. Two prototypes, micro-RWELL and micro-RWELL-GEM were built and tested. Gas amplification of micro-RWELL detector was measured with several gas mixtures and maximum gain between 20000 and 30000 was observed. However, maximum gain is fluctuating from measurement to measurement by a factor of 2 and thus a safety margin of 2-3 is needed to provide reliable operation of the device. In order to increase the signal GEM was added to micro-RWELL, new prototype was tested with the same gas mixtures and gains above 10<sup>5</sup> have been demonstrated. Time resolution achieved for both prototypes are 7 ns for micro-RWELL and 4 ns for micro-RWELL-GEM.

#### Developed for **CMD3** upgrade disks (4 sectors  $50 \times 50 \text{ cm}^2$ )

The GEM must be stretched: sizes larger than  $50 \times 50 \text{cm}^2$ could be critical (depending on the gas gaps size).

- 2D CS readout reduces the gain from 10<sup>4</sup> to 3-4 10<sup>3</sup>  $\rightarrow$  the detector stability is put at risk
- GEM-  $\mu$ Rwell hybrid configuration will be tested to increase the gain higher than 10 000
- A test beam will take place in Oct/Nov 2025 to test 2 10x10 cm2 GEM+  $\mu$ Rwell hybrids

The **μ-RWELL** is a Resistive MPGD detector (Micro Pattern Gas Detector) The device is composed of two elements:

- drift/cathode PCB defining the gas gap ( $5 \mu m$  Cu layer on the bottom side) Used Gas : Ar:CO<sub>2</sub>:CF<sub>4</sub> 45:15:40 mix
- μ-RWELL\_PCB (detector core)

**Amplification stage:** → 50 μm thick Kapton (Apical®) foil With a 5 μm Cu layer on the top side

Surface resistivity:  $\rho = 10 \div 100 M\Omega/\Box$

## **− KWeII Lechnology**  $μ$  – Rwell Technology

The "WELL" acts as a multiplication channel for the T<sub>rop copper layer</sub> ionization produced in the gas of the drift gap

The charge induced on the resistive layer is spread with a time constant:

• The resistive stage ensures the quenching of the spark amplitude

• As a *drawback, t*he capability to stand high particle fluxes is reduced, but appropriate grounding schemes of the resistive layer solves this problem



### − **kwell lechnology LUMI LUMI**  $μ$  – Rwell Technology

Studies have been focused on the DLC grounding layout to increase the rate capability while maintaining a safe resistivity  $\Rightarrow$  The solution is to reduce as much as possible the current path towards the ground connection introducing a high density "grounding network" on the resistive stage of the detector



The active area is discontinued by grooves that uncover the DLC; then a copper plating, carefully separated from the copper in the active sectors, is disposed to connect the DLC to the ground.

*A small dead zone on the amplification stage must be introduced for high stability operation*  $\rightarrow$  next talk by Mariangela Bondì





## $\mu$  – Rwell Technology

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### **''capacitive-sharing readout structures'' for electronic channels reduction**

- Ø charge transfer and charge sharing for large pitch (strip or pad) anode readout PCB layers using capacitive coupling between a stack of layers of pads.
- $\triangleright$  Capacitive-sharing readout structures offer a very good spatial resolution capability with significant reduction of electronic channels required to read out large-area MPGD trackers



## $\mu$  – Rwell Technology



The spatial resolution is strongly dependent on the impinging angle of the track  $\rightarrow$  A non-uniform resolution in the solid angle covered by the apparatus  $\rightarrow$  Large systematical errors.



## − **KWeII Lechnology**  $μ$  – Rwell Technology

### The μ-RWELL exhibits several interesting features:

- **Compactness**
- Easy assembly
- Easy powering
- Intrinsic spark quenching

### μ-RWELL performances:

- Gas gain  $\rightarrow$  10<sup>4</sup>
- Rate capability HR version  $\rightarrow$  10 MHz/cm2
- Spatial resolution  $\rightarrow$  down to 60  $\mu$ m
- Time resolution  $\rightarrow$  5-6 ns

Fast time response and high spatial resolution make this detector **suitable** for the high luminosity upgrade.

### **INFN R&D phase is addressing the following topics, in a strep-by-step strategy:**

- § **2D readout scheme:** 2 x 1D vs 2D à la "COMPASS" vs Bottom/Top Readout
- **Electronics channels reduction:**  $\text{minimum}$  pitch compatible with  $100 \mu m$  resolution vs capacity sharing
- § **High-rate** capability and improved grounding scheme
- § **Large area** detectors
- § **R1 detector design** optimization



## **The R1 detector configuration**

- The DC-R1 active area is a trapezoid with a height of 151 cm, a large base of 146.2 cm, and a small base of 10.4 cm<br>• With available foil sizes for MPGD detectors, such an area cannot be covered with a single foil. The w
- $\bullet$ be constructed from three sections
- The largest of the three sections will be prototyped as part of the initial R&D. The readout will be based on APV25 chip, currently used in many GEM detectors. Exploring newer chips (SAMPA and VMM3) for the main detector.



 $\rightarrow$  next talk by Mariangela Bondì for tracking simulations

- The largest segment is a trapezoid with a large base of 146.2 cm, the height of the chamber will be 50 cm, the small base of  $101.2 \text{ cm}$
- The readout concept is U-V strips with  $±10°$  stereo angles relative to the base of the trapezoid, strips traced on two sides of the readout plane will be used.
- The charge share will be through capacitive coupling. The pitch size of the readout 0.8 mm, the strip width 0.4 mm.
- The total number of U&V readout strips is about 685.



## **Prototyping @ JLAB**

- μRWELL with capacitive sharing readout provides 2D points in front of drift chambers
- § Simulation studies with background merging and μRWELL + DC + AI result in improved inefficiency of better than 0.1 % per nA, (15% @ 150 nA) better than upgrade design goal
- § CLAS12 readiness for higher luminosities is key for future success
- Beam-tests of a large-area µRWELL during the last days of RG-C were not successful



- End of May, significant leaks at both the supply and return manifolds were found
- § Using a different gas mixture, the measured efficiency was significantly improved (but still not better than 70%)

### Large area detector

- The detector has the same 2D read-out scheme as the  $10x10$  cm<sup>2</sup> capacity sharing version prototype (being tested during at SPS - NA- H8 at CERN)

## **Results and Perspectives**

### TOP read-out

### Summary of Results detailed by Mariangela Bondì in the next talk

- The Top-readout efficiency is 80-82% (compatible with the geometrical acceptance of 87%).
- There is an issue with the efficiency plateau below 600V HV. The signal produced does not suffer from sharing between the 2 readout views.
- Spatial resolution is 250-350  $\mu$ m, compatible with pitch/ $\sqrt{12}$

### Capacity Sharing read-out

- The CS shows an efficiency plateau at 92-93% as a function of HV from 600 to 660V (too high!)
- The charge spread allows a very good spatial resolution, <100 μm (at high HV).
- The average cluster size increases with HV.

## $\boldsymbol{\mu}$  − Rwell for HI-LUMI

### **The problem: CLAS12 Luminosity - Detectors Limitations**

Nominal CLAS12 luminosity  $\mathcal{L} = 10^{35}$  cm<sup>-2</sup> sec<sup>-1</sup> is achieved on a 5 cm LH2 target at  $I_e = 75$  nA



Most Data Taking currently limited the current on target to  $I<sub>e</sub>$  = 45 nA to maximize the figure of merit  $\mathcal{L} \times \eta$  for three-prongs events.

> $\mathcal{L} = 0.7 10^{35}$  cm<sup>-2</sup>s<sup>-1</sup>  $\eta_{3p}$  = 0.85<sup>3</sup> = 0.55

- **at present** experiments with 2-particles in the final state are getting only ~40% of the expected statistics
- **AI – assisted tracking** has been developed to improve reconstruction efficiency → PASS 2

### **The problem: CLAS12 Luminosity - Detectors Limitations**

Main efficiency limitation is due to DC occupancy in R1
